OVERVIEW

According to the 2020 census the City of Anderson has a population of 11,323. This annual report provides a look at crime within our community. There are many things that contribute to the crime rate. Some of these include:

- Inflation
- Changes in Population
- Decriminalization of Laws and Drugs
- Lack of Mental Health Treatment
- Prison Releases
- County Jail Bed Space
- Lack of Prosecution of Crimes
- The Unemployment Rate
- Social Change



Proactively enforcing the law, preventing crime, apprehending criminals, protecting life and property, preserving the quality of life, and working with our community to combat crime is the priority of the Anderson Police Department. Police Department personnel work diligently, employing strategies to fight crime and work with our citizens and business community.

In 2024, the City of Anderson experienced a 33% decrease in total Part 1 crimes compared to 2023. There are seven catergories of Part 1 crimes: Homicide, Rape, Robbery, Assault, Burglary, Larceny, and Motor Vehicle Theft.

The information on the following pages provide the total number of Part 1 crimes reported in each category for the past five years.






In 2024, the Anderson Police Department responded to a total of 15,697 calls for service, wrote 2793 case reports and a made a total of 828 arrests. There were also approximately 3986 calls into the Records Division.

Not all of the crimes reported are Part I Crimes. Examples of other types of calls for service include: Prowler Calls, Abandoned Vehicles, Lost Children, Missing Persons, Traffic Hazards, Speeding Vehicles, Traffic Collisions, Fraud, Financial Crimes, Identify Theft, Annoying Telephone Calls, Drunk Drivers, Citizen Assists, Disturbances, Medical Aid Calls, Incomplete 9-1-1's, Extra Patrols, Drug crimes and many more. All of these calls for service creates an incident to which Anderson Police Department officers and/or community service officers respond. Each of these calls have an interaction with public safety dispatchers, and/or public safety records clerks

FIVE-YEAR COMPARISION TOTAL PART 1 CRIMES




VIOLENT CRIME

In 2024, there were 91 cases of violent crime (Homicide, Rape, Robbery, and Assaults) compared to 58 in 2023, an increase of 57%



PROPERTY CRIME

In 2024, there were 159 property crime cases (Burglary, Larceny, and Motor Vehicle Theft) compared to 315 in 2023, a decrease of 49.5%






GENERAL ARREST STATISTICS

Total arrests in 2024 were 828 compared to 1204 arrests in 2023 This is a raw decrease of 376 arrests or a total decrease of 31%






The Anderson Police Department has had one full-time traffic officer since late 2020. Through the acquisition of grant funding, the Office of Traffic Safety funds our department for participation in multi-agency impaired driving checkpoints and saturation patrol. Our traffic officer also responds to assist with other patrol related crimes .


FIVE-YEAR COMPARISON OF TOTAL TRAFFIC COLLISIONS




IMPAIRED DRIVING




The Anderson Police Department has made it a priority to focus on DUI-related traffic collisions. We have joined allied agencies to educate and target impaired driving. We will continue to work diligently to reduce instances of DUI.



Traffic citations are primarily issued by the department's traffic officer; however officers issue traffic related citations. In 2024 officers issued a total of 520 traffic citations, which is a 28% decrease from the 690 citations issued in 2023.

The Anderson Police Department along with other Shasta County public safety agencies utilize a survey system to assist in receiving community feedback and service satisfaction. The service was launched in September of 2023 and is provided by a company called SPIDR TECH. The company sends out automatic updates during a call for service and after a call for service. The notifications keep calls informed of officer response times, incident results, and other information related to the incident they reported. At the conclusion of the incident, the caller has the option to complete a survey relating to the service they were provided by the Anderson Police Department. The following is a summary of survey responses:
